Strikingly coloured and easy to grow cultivar, suitable for exhibition, containers and bedding. Largely self-deadheading, it is also nicely compact, and breaks well. Flowers are medium sized, and hang on a fairly long pedicel. Tube: White and very short. Sepals: Pale rose pink (62B) with apple green tips, held almost fully up and recurved. Corolla: Violet reddish purple (80B), with a distinct patch of very pale pink\white at the base of each petal. Only slightly flared. Foliage: Small, neat leaves. Dark greyish green.

It's a first class light red and white single, that deserves to be more widely grown and shown. It's naturally short-jointed, and bushy. The flowers, displayed noticeably outwards, are small, but more than make up for this by being so freely and evenly produced. All is neat and beautifully proportioned. Trouble-free, a great fuchsia. John said of it: "It is the best plant I have ever produced, upright, vigorous, uniform". That's some recommendation from someone who's been growing fuchsias for over 55 years.

Foliage: Darkish mid green. 'Frank Saunders' x 'Lillian Annetts'.

Sepals: Carmine at base then mottled carmine and green to green at tips, held horizontally with slight reflex when mature. Corolla: Periwinkle blue with slight pink veining, ½ flared when mature. Foliage: Mid to darkish green.

Foliage: Mid green.

Very attractive, interesting flowers produced generously, another much underrated fuchsia. Recommended. Tube: Creamy white, long in proportion to flower size. Sepals: White with green tips, held horizontally with slight recurve at tips. Corolla: Fuchsia pink petal edges changing through paler pink to white in centre of petal base, ½ flared. Foliage: Pale mid green.

Sepals: White with pale pink edges and pale green tips, held slightly down from horizontal. Corolla: White with very slight pink flushes. ¼ flared when mature. Foliage: Darkish green.

This one catches the eye with its striking flower colours which seem to stand out, even glow, against the dark foliage. Recommended. Tube: Creamy white with pink blush, short. Sepals: White with hint of rose and green tips, held slightly down. Corolla: Rich fuchsia pink mixed with lavender, lighter at base, more pink at edges, ¼ flared. Foliage: Dark green on top, mid green under.

A very attractively coloured semi double flower with variegated foliage, make a beautiful display. Strong upright grower, flowers freely. Tube: White, fairly short. Sepals: White with apple green tips, broad, held ½ up and slightly reflexed. Corolla: White at base, shading through pink to mauve-lilac, darker edges. Foliage: Light green and yellow variegated.

Small to medium sized flowers appear bright and display well against the mid green foliage, lovely container or bedding plant. Tube: White with pale pink striping. Sepals: Creamy-white, recurved and greenish at tips. Corolla: Cerise, creamy-white at base. Foliage: Medium green with serrated edged leaves.

Named in honour of the 21st anniversary of the Black Country Fuchsia Society in the UK. Tube: Deep pink, short. Sepals: Deep pink with green tips, held slightly up from horizontal. Corolla: Purple-plum. ¼ flared when mature. Foliage: Mid green.

## Bush A - B

A free flowering vigorous bush, easy to grow. Was once a very popular show bench cultivar and could still hold its own. Tube: Bold red, short. Sepals: Bold red, held horizontal with recurved tips. Corolla: Very deep purple, almost black, ¼ flared. Foliage: Mid to dark green.

### Bland's New Striped

A fine bush, excellent in containers and makes a very good standard. Tube: Amaranth red. Sepals: Amaranth red, held slightly up and fully recurved almost to the tube. Curly. Corolla: Bold purple with streaks of raspberry down through the centre of the petals. ½ flared. Foliage: Mid green.

### Blue Sleighbells

Gorgeous, right up there with the very best of the blues. Produces lots of flowers and is largely self dead-heading. Tube: White, faint striping. Sepals: Long, bright white fading to apple green. Corolla: Strong lavender blue with white 'flames' at base. Foliage: Mid green.

Strikingly pretty, flowers freely and naturally produces a well shaped bush. Flowers face partially outwards. Tube: Short, carmine pink. Sepals: Carmine pink through white to apple green tips, horizontal with slight recurve. Corolla: Carmine pink blush at base fading to bright clean white with carmine pink veins near base. Foliage: Mid green.

### Brian McFetridge

Naturally bushy and short jointed, produces a lot of flowers, easy to grow and very beautiful. Tube: Red with darker stripes, slender. Sepals: Red-violet, paler towards green tips, held fully up. Corolla: Indigo-purple, ½ flared when mature. Foliage: Mid green.

Vigorous grower. Easy but is a greedy fuchsia that needs to be fed well. Tube: White, plump and short. Sepals: White on top, pink underside, green tipped. Corolla: Lavender faintly blushed with rose, delicate pink veined. Foliage: Medium green.

Smallish upright bush suitable for quarter or half standards as well as containers or bedding. Happy in full sun. Tube: White with pink stripes, short. Sepals: White with deep rose pink stripes, held half up. Corolla: Violet, bold. Slightly flared and barrel shaped. Foliage: Mid green.

## Bush C - E

### Cambridge Louie

Flowers and flowers, at least two per node, a wonderful fuchsia, that's a favourite with exhibitors and gardeners alike. Keep in good light, (not full sun) and get it outdoors as much as you can in Spring, as soon as it's safe to do so. Quickly gets leggy under glass. No fuchsia copes well with overwatering, but Cambridge Louie is particularly sensitive to it when cuttings are first potted, and will respond in the traditional way, by quickly dying. Apparently named after a keen lady gardener who sadly lost her sight but was able to tell her beloved fuchsias apart by their smell. Tube: Warm pink, medium sized. Sepals: Quite long, warm pink, held horizontally with a trace of green on the recurved tips. Corolla: Pinkish violet, ¼ flared, smooth petal edges. Foliage: Mid green.

### Canny Bob

Stiffly upright bush fuchsia with numerous semi-erect smallish white and coral pink flowers. Superb container, pot or summer bedding plant. Flower: Single, small. Tube: White, short. Sepals: White with tiny green tips, held slightly down from horizontal. Corolla: Baby pink with bold bright coral pink picotee edges to the petals. ¼ flared. Foliage: Mid green.

### Caroline

Makes a superb half standard as well as being an excellent container fuchsia. Tube: Pink, short. Sepals: Pink with cream flushes, held fully up and recurved. Corolla: Lavender-violet, ¾ flared and bell-shaped. Foliage: Mid green.

Flowers profusely, a very reliable cultivar for a superb display. Tube: Short, Orangey red. Sepals: Orangey red fading to green, short, slightly recurved. Corolla: Orange to red. Foliage: Medium green with slightly lighter undersides. F. cordifolia hybrid.

### Chartwell

Flowers profusely and easy to grow. Ideal summer bedding or container plant. Medium sized. Tube: White. Sepals: Rhodamine pink fading through white to green tips. Slightly swept back from corolla and with recurved tips. Corolla: A bold wisteria blue growing paler toward base of petals. Foliage: Medium green. Christine Clements x Cloverdale Pearl.

### Checkerboard

Flowers early, profusely and over a long period. Easy to grow. Highly recommended trouble free cultivar which can be trained easily to most shapes, though it doesn't do weeping styles easily. Very stiff upright growth, makes excellent ½, ¾ or full standards. Awards: RHS AGM. Medium sized. Tube: Red, sometimes striped. Fairly long. Sepals: Red at base then suddenly changes to white. Slightly swept back from corolla and recurved. Corolla: Darker red than tube, with white at the base of the petals. Foliage: Medium green, finely serrated leaves.

### Cherry Lee

A very lovely and elegant fuchsia, that like so many of the most beautiful, is very hard to describe properly. Hybridized by Nancy Phillips, who with her husband Arthur, does so much to promote the fuchsia both in the UK and the US. Superb blooms, complimented by unusually bright and attractive foliage. A most distinctive and striking plant. Tube: About 1.5cm (5/8") long, almost pure white, . Sepals: About 4cm (1 1/2" long. White with a reddish pink flush at the base, fading to pinkish white towards the tips. Held horizontally and recurved, with a slight twist. Corolla: Long (2.5cm (1") or more), with smooth petals of blue violet (93B), fading towards a creamy white at the base of the petal, with a purple red flush and stripe, ¾ flared. Foliage: An unusual shade of yellow green (145B)..

### Clipper

Easy to grow and very rewarding, bright and abundant large flowers of substance and intense depth of colour. Tube: Scarlet, curvy. Sepals: Scarlet, held ½ to ¾ up, reflexed. Corolla: Purple, shaded lighter at the base and darker at edges, ½ flared. Foliage: Dark Green.

## Bush C - E



A jewel is a fair description of this beauty. Flowers very freely. Flower: Semi-double. Tube: Rose. Sepals: Rose fading through pink to green tips, held half up. Corolla: Wisteria blue, rose pink veining towards paler pink petal base. ¼ flared when mature. Foliage: Mid green.

### Coronation

This is a large double, with a long tube and sepals of creamy white/pale pink. The fully double flowers are pink splashed with red.

### Countess of Aberdeen

This lovely old cultivar is fairly slow growing, stiffly upright and compact. It took us a long time to obtain a plant of it, and we can safely say its reputation for being slow and difficult to root from cuttings is fully justified. We too, will have very few available. Not particularly easy to grow either. Like many of the most highly desirable fuchsias, this one absolutely will not tolerate overwatering. (Don't say we didn't warn you!) Countess of Aberdeen has small, utterly gorgeous slightly outward facing flowers clustered towards the tops of the stems, set off by very handsome and close set dark, toothed leaves. The flowers are paler colours than described below when growing in shade. Tube: The tube is short and white (N155B). Sepals: Short and broad, light red pink (38D), held horizontally. Corolla: The lower part of the corolla is purple red (N57A), with the upper part a dark pink red (52A). ½ flared, smooth petal edges. Foliage: Dark green.

### Coxeen

It's easy to see why this delightful old lady has survived for so long, although not easy to find nowadays. Quite lovely flowers with relatively short pure white sepals which contrast well with both the darker tube and sepals. Tube: Medium, slightly bulbous, dark pinkish coral, almost striped appearance. Sepals: Short and relatively broad, held horizontally. Pure white, with slender greenish tips. Corolla: Purple pink with a white flush from the top, ½ flared, smooth petal edges. Foliage: Mid green.

### Crosby Soroptimist

Dave Clark says on his website: This fuchsia is a show quality fuchsia and had won many awards nationwide. It is a true single. It has a compact growth pattern which is easy to shape. An excellent show variety that also makes an excellent standard. The flowers are also complimented by extremely dark green foliage. Very easy to grow and propagate. It was named and dedicated to the local Crosby Soroptimist Society at the request of the late Mrs. Margaret Berger, a past President. Margaret, a lovely lady, was also the Secretary of Merseyside Fuchsia Group. Tube: Short, creamy white, with pink candy stripes. Sepals: Held horizontally. Pink, with a scarlet vein in the centre, and a trace of apple green on the recurved tips. Corolla: Cream veined pink which is complimented with burgundy anthers and stigma. ½ flared, smooth petal edges. Foliage: Dark green.

### Cumbrian Lass

Very beautiful vigorous bush with numerous flowers. Unusual corolla colouring, most attractive. Tube: Pink, short. Sepals: Pink, bolder at edges, held fully up and recurved. Corolla: White with slight lavender smokiness. No flare. Foliage: Mid green.

### Dainty Lady

This is a very pretty fuchsia in classic red and white, complemented by handsome dark foliage and stems. Tube: Short, dark red with a bulbous shape. Sepals: Broad, and rather short, dark pink red, held fully up. Corolla: Creamy white petals, ¼ flared with distinct dark pink veins. Foliage: Dark green.

Compact and vigorous grower with beautifully shaped tastefully coloured flowers. Flower: Single, medium. Tube: Rich burgundy. Sepals: Deep burgundy, held fully up and recurved. Corolla: Dark indigo and purple-violet, burgundy at base of petals. Fully flared when mature. Foliage: Darkish mid green.


